INTERVIEW WITH AMANDA MCELVEEN JLLC Sustainer - Local Insurance Agent

Q: How long have you been in the League and in what committees did you participate in?

A: I joined the League in 2002, shortly after moving to Lake Charles. It's hard to believe that was 20 years ago. I served on many different committees, mostly community and membership focused. I loved the community placements. I loved Lego Motion at the McNeese Autism Program, Helping Hands art program at Moss Regional's Oncology department, and the Leader in Me at Oak Park and Maplewood.

Q: What were your fondest memories that you made from your League experience?

A: My first thought is of working in the Moss Regional Oncology center in the little art room the League put together. I loved going there every Friday sitting with the patients, making jewelry, and assisting them as they painted. I was fortunate to serve on many wonderful community projects, but that was my favorite! Also... the relationships. In 2002, Dana Dingler Hebert formed a bunco group with some members of our provisional class. I was brand new to Lake Charles and only knew a handful of people. I loved meeting like-minded women who wanted to develop the potential of women, improve the community and promote volunteerism. We have served the community together, raised our children and are still close, 20 years later. Beyond that small group I met many other women I am proud to know and have opportunities to work with. Many sustainers became advisors and mentors to me during my active years in the League. I have not been actively involved for several years now, but every time I see JLLC news I am proud to be a member. I am always amazed by the work Junior League members accomplish working effectively as trained volunteers.

Q: How has being in the League impacted you personally?

A: As I mentioned, I met some of my dearest friends while in the League. The training and hands on leadership opportunities helped me develop public speaking, organizational and interpersonal skills. I loved serving the community and never saw myself serving on the board. However, serving on the board was a wonderful experience. Melanie LeJeune and Rebekah Winters taught me a lot about effectively working with a board. Denise Rau, Ashley Kerns and Jennifer Templet taught me that the most important thing I needed to learn was the budget. Digging into each line item of the League's revenue and expenses was time well spent. When Willie Mount said she would serve as sustaining advisor to the board, we gained a wealth of knowledge and positive energy. Willie's wisdom was invaluable and guided us directly back to the mission. To answer your question about the League's impact on me personally, I have to say, this wonderful organization of women taught me how to promote voluntarism, develop the potential of women and improve the community through the effective action and leadership of trained volunteers. I am proud of the training I received in the league!

Q: What skills did you develop from your League experience that directly contributed to success in your career?

A: I have taken a lot of JLLC lessons directly into my career. Having a strategic plan, defining job responsibilities, developing procedures that can be easily transitioned, working ahead, celebrating small victories, recruiting great people, investing in training opportunities, running to problems, acknowledging that mistakes happen and become apportunities for growth, recognizing the positive side of people having different personalities, being resilient.

OVER THE LAST 10 YEARS JLLC HAS AWARDED \$177,000

IN GRANTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS



The Junior League of Lake Charles (JLLC) Branch Out and Grow Grant is again available to educators in the five-parish area (Calcasieu, Cameron, Jefferson Davis, Beauregard, and Allen.) For several years. this program has supported the enhancement of student experiences by awarding monetary grants ranging from \$500 to \$2,500 and by contributing the time of League members with volunteer hours as requested by applicants. Our last funded year awarded over \$17,000 to educators around our area! Applications for the Branch Out and Grow Grant program are available to all school-based professionals.



In addition, JLLC is pleased to offer the Taking Education and Children Higher (TEACH) award. It will award \$5.000 to one individual educator!

All grants awarded shall be used for projects that benefit students and should fit within the JLLC's vision of supporting a more confident, healthy, and educated community. It is through these grant awards that the League continues to support educators who empower and engage children, as well as promote healthy and thriving families in our community.

The Junior League of Lake Charles will also award several \$750 scholarships to community and goal-oriented young women that may be used for any accredited college, university, or technical trade school.

PROVIDING SWLA WITH FREE CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY SEATS

Due to incredible money management in the 2021-2022 league year, all three fundraisers, Mistletoe & Moss, Casino Night and Touch-A-Truck, came in well under budget. The board was able to reallocate funds from Fund Development to purchase 50 car seats. These car seats were donated in time for the "Click it or Ticket" event put on by the Louisiana Passenger Safety Task Force and Louisiana State Police Troop D on May 21, 2022.

At the Click it or Ticket event, JLLC volunteers were able to assist with car seat checks, alongside the certified Task Force Technicians. The 50 donated car seats were handed out on an as needed basis if any car seat failed the inspection. This donation ensured that every child that attended the event left properly restrained. This was the largest car seat donation ever made to the Louisiana Passenger Safety Task Force. The car seats JLLC purchased were convertible car seats to grow and adapt with the child. Parents and caregivers can make a lifesaving difference by checking whether their children are properly buckled on every trip. Thanks to JLLC, parents and caregivers who are unable to afford to properly restrain their child were helped.

Our region is one of the highest regions in the state for child deaths due to vehicular accidents. JLLC was able to recognize this need in our community and use the opportunity to make an impact with an already established event alluding to the fact we didn't reinvent the wheel and made a decision fast to have an impact. I am excited by this new partnership for JLLC and know our continued partnership will result in an even bigger impact in our community.









Snack Sacks

ADRESSING FOOD INSECURITY DURING
SCHOOL BREAKS

As part of the League's effort to combat food insecurity in our community, the JLLC has partnered again this year with local schools to provide nutritious, child-friendly snacks and meals to students during holiday breaks. Our Snack Sacks program, and others like it, fill a critical gap for children in our community who qualify for free or reduced school lunches and helps reduce the burdens facing working families. With assistance from sororities and fraternities at McNeese State University, the League was able to deliver over 2000 Snack Sacks over the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter school breaks to students at Brentwood, Combre-Fondel, J.D. Clifton, Ralph Wilson, and Pearl Watson elementary schools.

For Fall 2022, the League is again planning to deliver Snack Sacks. Members will have ample opportunity to satisfy CCE credit requirements by helping with the packing and distribution of sacks. We also plan to continue with last year's Pack a Snack Sack event at Mistletoe & Moss so that shoppers have the opportunity to donate to the program and pack snack bags for students. The Community Outreach Committee thanks everyone for their support and participation in this important program.

In July, Junior League of Lake Charles leaders joined Mayor Nic Hunter to present the League's \$100,000 contribution to the Port Wonder project. The League is thrilled to have been able to honor this pledge as part the effort to re-investment into League Legacy projects.

JLLC has supported the Children's Museum of Lake Charles since it was founded as a League project in 1987 and continues that support by investing in Port Wonder, a new education and entertainment venue in Downtown Lake Charles that broke ground last year. Port Wonder will house the Children's Museum together with a new science and nature center to be administered by the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries. The League's investment into Port Wonder serves the joint goal of protecting the Museum as a signature legacy project while also promoting the development a new joint facility that will serve the community and visitors for years to come.

Open your phone's camera!



12 whole honey or chocolate graham crackers
6 squares white almond bark
1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
2 squares chocolate almond bark
2 squares white almond bark

Line a 10x15-inch pan with foil and coat with nonstick cooking spray. Fit the graham crackers in a single layer into the prepared pan. Combine 6 squares white almond bark and the peanut butter in a microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on High until melted, stirring occasionally. Spread over the graham cracker.

Melt the chocolate almond bark in a microwave-safe bowl in the microwave and drizzle over the white almond bark layer. Melt 2 squares white almond bark in a microwave-safe bowl in the microwave. Drizzle over the chocolate almond bark layer and swirl with a wooden pick, if desired. Chill for 10 minutes or until firm. Break into pieces and store in an upright container in the refrigerator.


